One in Nine Billion

t was supposed to be the last day of her life. Riding high on top of the tractor trailer stacked full of crates filled with hundreds of chickens destined for the slaughterhouse, the young hen was freezing and terrified. Her entire short five week life had been spent in a cramped, windowless barn. Although this was the first time she had ever seen the sun and the sky, it was not a pleasant trip. Winter winds whipped through the unprotected crates as the truck sped down the road. Panicked and struggling to escape, she somehow managed to squeeze herself between the metal bars of the cage, as the truck raced along. In an instant she plunged rapidly down to meet the road far below, hitting the asphalt hard and rolling onto the shoulder of the highway. Badly injured, she lay very still, unable to move. But she was alive.

On this day, of the millions of chickens who were being trucked to the slaughterhouse to be killed for their meat, she was the one who got away.

Erin Dean, a kind woman who lived nearby, dreaded driving behind the large trucks full of chickens on her daily work commute. A vegetarian, she frequently noticed and was depressed by the piles of white feathers that littered the sides of the road, from the many chickens who had fallen and perished. But on this cold February afternoon, she saw something on the highway shoulder she had never seen before – one of the chickens was sitting up.

Assuming it was her imagination but wanting to double check, Erin quickly pulled off the road. She was shocked to

find that although very bloody and bruised the chicken was, in fact, still breathing. Lifting her gently, she wrapped her in a towel from her car, and drove her home. Erin then called Poplar Spring and the next morning drove almost three hours to bring her to the sanctuary.

When she arrived, the little hen was still unresponsive and in shock. She had an open fracture on one wing, and her head was scabbed and bruised, with one eye injured and swollen shut. Under her tail was a large area of missing feathers, covered with dried blood. She was uninterested in food or water, so we began tube feeding her, giving her subcutaneous fluids and started her on antibiotics. We treated her wounds and stabilized her wing, setting her up in our warm kitchen where she could receive round the clock care. After about 48 hours, she slowly began to come around, and started to eat and drink on her own. One day, I was sitting at my desk working

and I heard a scratching noise. I looked up to see the little hen walk all the way across the room, and she plopped down right next to my feet. I sat down on the floor next to her and she flapped up into my lap! We named her Emilene (Emmy for short) and watched in amazement over the next few weeks as she healed and became very friendly and sweet. She now loves to be petted, and will close her eyes while her head is softly stroked. Even after everything that humans have done to her, she loves to be with people, and follows us around. She is now healthy and fully recovered (although blind in one eye), and is enjoying basking in the sunshine and pecking and scratching in the grass with the other rescued chickens. .

Emmy is growing rapidly, and has already doubled in size in one month. The chicken industry has genetically manipulated broiler chickens to grow very fast and to have large heavy breasts, which is the primary part of meat desired by consumers. But this has resulted in birds whose skeletons often times cannot bear their own weight. They tend to have problems with arthritis and fractures, and will often die suddenly of heart attacks. The average life expectancy for the breed, even those who are rescued, is less than a year. We know we will not have Emmy long, but we intend to give her the best life possible, to make up for her horrible beginnings, and in honor of the 9 billion other chickens killed annually in the United States, who will never have a chance.

Andy and Sammie

The oldest and youngest sheep find comfort in each other

This year we have taken in many animals with special needs. In August Sammie arrived, an elderly Cormo ewe, who is severely arthritic and was unwanted by her former owners. They were moving away and did not want to transport her with their other sheep. We were contacted only a few days before their move, and when asked why they hadn't made arrangements sooner, the woman said she was hoping Sammie would "just die".

A few months after Sammie arrived we received Andy, a young Katahdin sheep who was rescued from a farm where he had been purchased to raise and eat for the farm's annual lamb barbecue. When Andy became sick, the owners left him to die in a cardboard box. A visitor to the farm rescued him but left his infected legs untreated, and his joints later became fused and rigid. When Andy arrived at Poplar Spring he was barely able to hobble around, but he has improved greatly with medication and physical therapy. We housed him in a stall with Sammie every

evening, thinking she would be a good companion. Sammie, who had previously had all her babies taken away from her and sold for lamb meat, instantly fell in love with little Andy, and the feeling was mutual. They both enjoy cuddling together every night, and if one is out of the other's sight during the day, they constantly call back and forth until they are together again. It is wonderful to see two animals who were once unwanted finding such great comfort in each other, and to now be surrounded by so many people who love them.

RUPERT

pupert Rupert is one of our newest rescues, who came from a very tragic situation. He is a young Toulouse goose (a domestic breed who cannot fly) who was abandoned along with another goose in an apartment complex courtyard in Maryland. Residents mistakenly reported to authorities that the abandoned geese were wild, and they were told to leave them alone and they would fly away. The poor geese wandered around the courtyard for days, with some of the kindly neighbors feeding them. One night, residents heard incessant loud honking, and looked out to see young men beating the geese with broken beer bottles. Police found the bloodied body of one goose, and Rupert, the survivor, honking and refusing to

leave her side. Geese are monogamous and mate for life, and even in death he

refused to abandon his girlfriend. He was taken to Second Chance Wildlife Center in Gaithersburg, where he trembled violently during his exam. He was found to have frostbite on his feet and one wing impaled by a six inch stick. He was treated for his injuries and kept at the Center for several days, and then brought to Poplar Spring. We kept him in a stall for a few days to make sure he was stable, and for days he would only eat if a person was with him. He liked to get up in our laps and enjoyed being pet-

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ted. Once he was eating well and the weather was better, we released him onto the pond, where he immediately honked and flew excitedly into the water, calling to all the other rescued geese and happily taking a bath. After several months he has totally acclimated and enjoys walking around the farm and swimming in the pond. He enjoys hanging out with the rescued Canada geese who live here permanently, and hopefully will choose one as his new companion someday soon. Rupert is now happy and safe, and he will be able to live here for the rest of his life where no one can ever harm him again..

where the chickens are to take on the sins of the person, and then killed. Many chickens were left behind to die, and we received five of these beautiful hens. They are now enjoying scratching and pecking in the grass, and dustbathing under the trees.

Over 600 people participated in the 5K Run and one mile Fun Walk, which was held again in beautiful Wheaton Park. In July we once again participated in the Montgomery County Farm Tour. Visitors to the farm enjoyed hay rides, our giant yard sale, and delicious vegan barbecue, fries and other treats from the awesome Randy Radish food truck, who donated all proceeds to the sanctuary. Despite being unseasonably hot, our 2013 Open House and Fundraiser in October brought large crowds of supporters, and raised an amazing \$75,000. for the rescued animals.
